Music with Michael Lankester ~ In-Person and on Zoom Beacon to the World: Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts

Following on from his series on Carnegie Hall, Michael Lankester takes a detailed look at the history of New York's Lincoln Center. In 1960 the Civil Rights Act was passed and just one year later a youthful John Fitzgerald Kennedy was elected president. The time was ripe. The concept of a new, thriving center of the arts in the middle of Manhattan was probably best presented by John D. Rockefeller when he stated, 'The arts are not for the privileged few, but for the many. Their place is not on the periphery of daily life, but at its center.' The Oxford Inklings Part 1 ~ In-Person The Imaginative Mind and the Pursuit of Power

At the end of the 1920s, a close friendship had begun to develop between two Oxford dons, C.S. Lewis and J.R.R. Tolkien, and this small nucleus would soon expand into a group which became known as The Inklings and has since acquired almost legendary status. As the poet and scholar John Wain observed, 'In a very dead period of Oxford's history, Lewis and his friends provided a stir of life.' The Inklings arguably gave rise to one canonical classic of English literature, Tolkien's The Lord of the Rings, as well as other lesser works. Over the length of this class, we will examine Tolkien's masterpiece as well as works by Lewis and Charles Williams. Fantasy and Faerie: The Uses of Enchantment and Moral Choice in C.S. Lewis's The Magician's Nephew

Law and Grace in C.S. Lewis's The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe Indiana Jones Comes to England: The Supernatural Novel and Charles Williams's War in Heaven

NUSHU Group is a sharing circle where we create time and space to check in with ourselves through reflection, writing, and saying things out loud. In NUSHU Group, the facilitator offers prompts for your consideration. You will have a few minutes to reflect and write. You can go wherever your mind takes you, as deeply as you feel comfortable going. At the end of that time, the floor will be opened to sharing. You can say as much or as little as you would like. Pass or "come back to me" is always an option. In these groups, there is no crosstalk or advice giving. Sometimes being present and listening to each other really is more than enough. The group will be led by Katie Guillory, who is a certified NUSHU Group facilitator. She has a knack for asking just the right questions to unlock insight. You will be surprised by this experience. Come explore yourself and share with others in person. This group will meet for 60-90 minutes.

We the People: Part 1 ~ In-Person

The first three words of the preamble to the U.S. Constitution immediately differentiate this document from all those declarations of rights that had come before it. Who were the men, that are now referred to as the Framers of the Constitution? What were their main concerns and how do they echo today in our lives, over 230 years later? Why did they pick our form of government? Why even before the ink was dry on the main Seven Articles of the Constitution, did they feel the need to add the first ten amendments, known today as the Bill of Rights? What were the driving forces behind future important amendments?

We will first review the main body of the original seven articles. Each will be reviewed with an eye toward their interpretation then and now. We will investigate the rather arcane institution known as the electoral college. The rules of the Senate, which are nowhere in the constitution yet impact our lives, will also get a closer look.

We will also review some of the key rights bestowed in the U.S. Constitution such as freedom of speech, freedom of religion, the right to bear arms, and the right to due process and equal protection under the law. And, observe how the application of those rights has changed over time.

The goal of our journey is not to develop a cadre of Constitutional scholars but to fulfill Thomas Jefferson's famous challenge "...a well-informed electorate is a prerequisite to democracy."

These discussions will occur over two semesters. The first eight weeks will cover the main articles of the Constitution, the rules of government. The second semester will cover the Bill of Rights and other key amendments.

For our common text, we will use <u>The U.S. Constitution</u> annotated by Ray Raphael available via the registration form for \$8.

This program is a continuation of the Fall 2023 'We the People.' Completion of that course is required. This second semester we will cover the Bill of Rights and other key amendments.

Winds of Change ~ In-Person

'As if depicting a before and after portrait of the United States, *The Great Gatsby* and *The Grapes of Wrath* provide a vivid picture of the affluence of the Roaring Twenties and the subsequent collapse into the poverty of the Depression. Indeed, in *The Great Gatsby* (1925), Fitzgerald provides an incisive look at Jazz Age America and at the rich and aspiring rich who attempt to achieve the American Dream in the wake of WWI, while Steinbeck's *The Grapes of Wrath* (1939) concerns itself with those who were displaced and dispossessed as a result of the financial and natural disasters - the winds of change - that blew through the duster-ravaged Depression. Participants in this class can expect to develop an appreciation of each author's style and thematic concerns, including such relevant, contemporary topics as the pursuit of wealth, racism, classism, societal and cultural codes, gender, and ethical behavior while also seeing how studying these texts in tandem can provide a window into this significant era in United States history.
